

Confused About Image Sizing?

We're hearing from the image submission filters (those brave, yet unsung heroes who collect our competition images monthly and make sure each passes formatting muster) that there appears to still be some confusion about how to size images for submission, particularly our vertical, or portrait mode, images. Everybody knows the 1024x768 rule by now, but every now and then we'll get vertical images that are 1024 pixels on the vertical side instead of the maximum 768. Let this little graphic help you think about this a different way.


In the Spotlight

He courted her for about a year before they married and they had two children, Connie (also a PTCC member) and Michael. In 1961 they bought a 37 acre property high above Highway 68 near the western edge of Toro Park that came with a horse. Jane still lives there with Connie, a granddaughter, a great-grandson, three horses and one cat; Michael lives next-door. Harold died in December 2014.

ane loves jig-saw puzzles, gardening, and she also belongs to a book group at her church. She had a movie camera and a little box camera when her kids were small. Around 1974, when Michael got out of the Air Force, Harold bought her a nice Kodak, but it broke when they went skiing and she whacked it on a ski. She bought a better one from Chuck Karnow in Salinas. A friend invited Jane to the Salinas Camera Club, where she eventually became President and was involved until they folded. Jane started coming to PTCC with friends from the Salinas Club and joined in about 1962. She says the club was "going great guns, then it made the change to digital and some people didn't want to give up their slides" at which time membership and spirit went way down. Jane served as Secretary from about 2001 until the club recovered from the digital switch. She also took care of bringing refreshments for 4-5 years and Harold made the wooden box that Chris J. still uses today. Over the years, when PTCC was a smaller group, Jane hosted several year-end dinners and summer barbecues at their 'ranch.'



ur February 28th, 2016 Pictorial #2: When plans for this year were being finalized, it was decided that one of the three pictorial competition this year would have a "Directed" element. At its meeting this month, the Board approved the element of "Light" for our Pict#2 which submits on February 28th. This concept was developed by pictorial competition chair, Joni Zabala, and our judge for this one, Doug Steakley. It is not about images wherein light is the subject or theme, rather where light is used to emphasize the main subject adding strength and impact. (See our Tips & Tricks column on page 4.) Tips & Tricks: The Importance of Light

ust in time for our February 2016 dedicated pictorial competition, Silke Laetz found an article about Light by Doug Steakley. Doug points out that we need to be aware not only of the direction of the light -- back, side, front -- but how important the quality of light is in our images. An image taken in bright sunlight will produce high contrast or dynamic range, whereas one taken in the light of a soft fog might bring out the background and more even tonality. Doug states that it's always a good idea to shoot at sunrise or sunset, or when conditions are stormy, cloudy or foggy. He really likes to shoot during or just after a rain when the air is filled with moisture. He calls this "wet" light and says this is a good time to use a polarizing filter. He ends this article with a wonderful quote from Galen Rowell: "I almost never set out to photograph a landscape...My first thought is always of light."

Changes To Our Image Posting Policy

We've not been able to establish a firm baseline on image posting to our website and Facebook and the information we have now is sketchy and in some cases incorrect. The Board approved an active opt-out policy for image posting preferences. The following may help you decide.

Winning images are posted to our website by competition. Images submitted for competition are posted to the Club's Facebook page in photo galleries by competition group. All images are posted at 72 ppi and generally no larger than 500 pixels on their long side.

Images posted to the website are attributed by accompanying text along with their place in the competition.

Images posted to our Facebook page are watermarked with the shooters name, as are the images projected during the returns, and also present any metadata description if present.

The images on the website and on our Facebook page do not enlarge or reproduce in any usable way.

Unless you actively opt-out of either of these, your images will be posted as indicated.

If your intent is to opt-out, notify membership chair, *Shelley Nemeth*, and your preference will be communicated to those who post to these two platforms.
