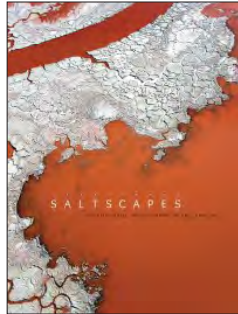


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April Was Exciting!

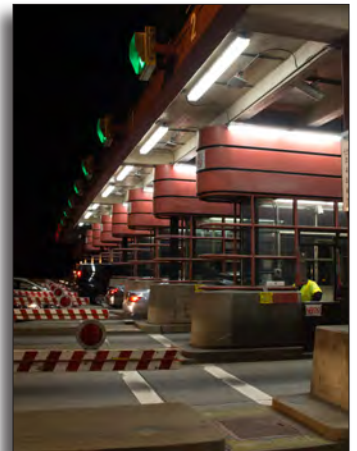
Introduced to the Club by PTCC member, **Brooks Leffler**, himself a talented Kite Aerial photographer, our guest on **April 6th** was renowned Kite Aerial photographer, **Cris Benton**, who presented an amazing glimpse into the art and craft of Kite Aerial Photography (KAP). When the obvious question, "Why not a drone?" came up, Benton's answer was, once heard, equally as obvious. To paraphrase: With a drone, your attention is weighted heavily toward flying the drone. With a kite, it just hangs there and you can concentrate on the photography. **Mr. Benton**, a retired Professor of Architecture at Berkeley, has spent a decade studying and photographing the salt ponds in the South Bay area. His recently published book, **Saltscapes**, is packed with his photographs and narrative insights into this fascinating and little understood area. His slide show and prints were fabulous! If you missed it or want to see more, here are several links. Mr. Benton's work is certainly worth a second look.

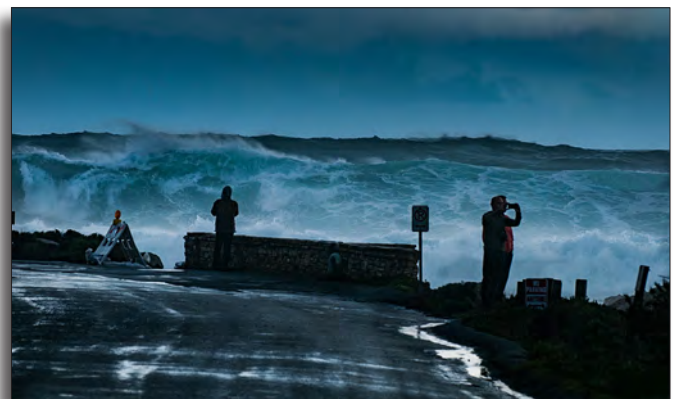

These beautiful calendars are sold at a wide variety of outlets throughout the county. All proceeds from the entry fees and calendar sales benefit the *Professional Artists in the Schools* program - providing arts education, arts-integrated curriculum and special arts and literacy workshops for thousands of students. Artwork should depict life, culture and the natural beauty of Monterey County's landscape. Artwork should be in a horizontal orientation. The calendar will be a large format (11 x 17) again this year. Please note that two scenes each from North County, Salinas Valley/South County, Seaside/Marina, Monterey Peninsula, Salinas and Big Sur will be selected.

In the Spotlight

Mary Ann Avera was born in Long Beach, California and lived in Southern California until 1994. She went to St. Anthony Girls High School and what was Long Beach State, now CSULB, where she majored in English. After graduating in 1973, she married John Avera, who after getting out of the Navy, was also going to Long Beach State. John then went to UCLA Dental School and worked part time. So Mary Ann worked full time, first in a pharmacy, then in a bank, then at Aetna Life and Casualty as a claims adjuster – a job she doesn't recommend.

Their first child, Thomas, was born in 1979, Mary Ann quit working when Tom was 10 months old. Their daughter, Erin, was born in 1984.

The Avera's traveled to Monterey to visit Mary Ann's sister who was in dental practice in Monterey. John and Mary Ann found the area so gorgeous that they decided it wasn't fair that her sister was the only family member to call the Peninsula home. In 1994, when a periodontal practice became available in Aptos, the Avera's jumped at the chance. They bought the practice and moved north, bringing Mary Anne's mother with them. Since then Mary Ann's second sister has also relocated here, completing the family's migration to paradise.

When asked how she got into photography, Mary Ann explained that John had been a photographer when he was in the Navy and he wanted to get back into it, so for John's birthday back in about 2003, Mary Ann gave him a Local Photo Tour Day with Doug Steakley. It was Doug who suggested that John join PTCC, but John wanted Mary Ann to join too, so it was something that they could do together. She balked at first, but joined, although she didn't take or submit pictures for a few months. Eventually she warmed up to it, obviously, since she's in the A Group and we've

all seen her beautiful images! Mary Ann says she basically learned photography (on film) from John, from reading a few books, but mostly from PTCC. She likes taking photos of a variety of subjects, particularly nature and landscape. PJ is her least favorite, but she says that's just because she's not good at it.

John had volunteered for Judge Acquisition and he recruited Mary Ann to help. Later she was in charge of PTCC Hospitality for seven years. Mary Ann observed that when she and John first joined PTCC the meetings and competitions felt a little more formal, but they've changed over the years to be a little looser, and perhaps friendlier, although Mary Ann finds the judging to be a bit more subjective and less by the book than it used to be. Tips and Tricks Creative Photography

The PTCC definition of *Creative* can be found on our website by clicking on *Competitions* on the left side of the **Home Page**. “*Creative photography is producing an image through the use of imaginative skill or originality of thought including the altering of reality. From a judging standpoint, no image should be eliminated from competition simply because it looks realistic, provided the image demonstrates originality of concept. Creative images may include modifications in the darkroom, on the computer, or in the camera, as well as unusual points of view, imaginative use of subject matter or lighting, or any other presentation that begins with the maker’s photograph or a collection of photographs.*”

It can be really helpful, and inspiring, to review the winning images of past competitions. Go to *Image Gallery* on the right side of the PTCC website **Home Page**, then at the bottom of the page you can visit previous year’s galleries and find the different competition categories.

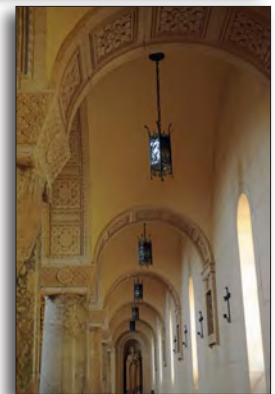
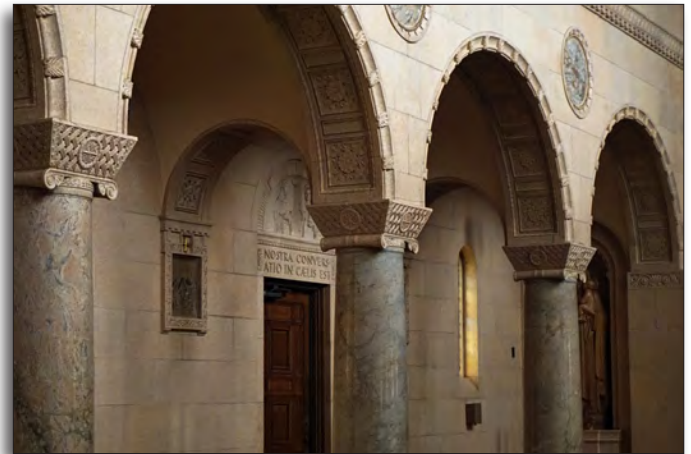


The PSA definition of *Creative* is “Altered Reality.” The image must obviously display a change in natural color, form, shape, or any combination of three. High Dynamic Range (HDR) images without further changes are not considered “altered reality.” The original image must be made by entrant on photographic emulsion or captured digitally. All images must be original and may not incorporate elements produced by anyone else. Original images must be altered by the maker; artwork or computer graphics generated by the entrant may be incorporated if the original photographic content predominates. Images may not be constructed entirely within a computer. The image’s core content must be identifiable. Non-creative images are not eligible for this competition. Any subject matter is acceptable as long as the Altered Reality guidelines are apparent.



Shots and Spots

From **Shelley Nemeth**: Easy access for locals, the Carmelite Monastery, just south of Carmel and north of Pt. Lobos, is accessible to the public. Their driveway is 0.7 miles south of Ribera Road, just before San Jose Creek Canyon Rd. Take a left off Hwy. 1 and follow the driveway up to a beautiful, historic church with many photo ops.

Built in 1931, the Monastery sits on a hillside just off Highway One across from Point Lobos and south of Carmel-by-the-Sea. The gardens surrounding the monastery are meticulously maintained by the Carmelite nuns and are full of colorful flowers, fragrant lemon trees, and benches for anyone who wants to sit, relax, and meditate.
