At our May 7th Meeting The Evolution of Pictorialism in Fine Art Photography

Cynthia Wagner Weick

n May 7th at our in person meeting at the *Pacific Grove Meals on Wheels Community Center*, we'll welcome *Cynthia Wagner Weick*, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus, University of the Pacific.



Pictorialism:

Pictorialism emerged in the 19th century as a manner of elevating photography to the realm of fine art versus documentation. This talk will focus on the work of pioneers of the approach, including Carleton Watkins (1829-1916), Gertrude Käsebier (1852-1934), Alfred Stieglitz (1864-1946) and William Dassonville (1879-1957), as well as three west coast photographers who began as pictorialists before transitioning to the direct approaches of Group f/64: Imogen Cunningham (1883-1976), Edward Weston (1886-1958) and Ansel Adams (1902-1984).

About Cynthia:

Since retiring in Carmel by the Sea in 2017, Cynthia Wagner Weick has pursued her lifelong interests in art and art history, focusing on the Monterey Bay region. She co-authored a book with Carmel artist Joaquin Turner - Preserving Nature: A Field Guide to the Art and Artists of the *Monterey Bay.* She has also published related articles in Carmel Magazine and Point Lobos Magazine, offered seminars for the Osher Life Long Learning Institute (OLLI), and been invited to deliver talks at various venues in the region. Dr. Weick is Professor Emeritus of Management at University of the Pacific, where she taught in the business and engineering schools for 27 years and authored over thirty articles and books. She earned her B.S. and M.S. from the Ohio State University and her Ph.D. in business administration from the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania.


The Center for Photographic Art (CPA) has organized a monthlong initiative to celebrate the historic roots of photography across the central coast.


Members' Shout-out Achievements Beyond PTCC



January 2025: Creative Judged by Eduardo Fujii

Early in his life, his parents introduced him to the arts, and he fell in love with classical music and painting. Busy college life though distracted him from his artistic path until about twelve years ago when he chose photography to express himself as an artist. His photography offers hints of the influence music and painting had and continue to have on his artistic style. His images have an unquestionable painterly look and are full of mystery and lyricism.

He has been developing his style through a process of selfdiscovery and always leaves part of himself in each one of his images. Eduardo truly believes that every photograph is a selfportrait.

Eduardo has participated in gallery exhibitions at the Center for Photographic Art (Carmel, CA), Cherry Center for the Arts (Carmel, CA), Alvarado Gallery (Monterey, CA), Museum of Monterey (Monterey, CA), Center for Fine Art Photography (Fort Collins, Colorado) and has received various awards including a Spotlight award from B&W, Color Magazine, Shadow & Light Magazine, Art & Beyond Magazine, PX3 Prix de la Photographie, Black and White Spider Awards, and the International Color Awards, among others.

About this competition:

The Club's Creative category is the only category that allows altered reality. If fact, it is required. It is intended for imaginative, artistic effects not otherwise possible in photography. Any photo that could be submitted to another competition probably doesn't qualify as creative photography. The final image should demonstrate originality of concept and/or imagination and must be based on the photographer's original photograph(s), with modifications made exclusively by the photographer. Images must include some alteration of reality, done either in post-processing or in the camera or both. This category is free from the restrictions of the other competition categories. Imagination and originality of concept are paramount.



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

February: Night Photography Judged by Michael Fredrich



Michael's interest in photography started when he was in grade school. He spent high school and much of college being more of a photographer than a student. After a long break from photography while pursuing a PhD in X-Ray Crystallography, and a harried early professional career, he came across Joseph Meehan's book *Panoramic Photography*, purchased a panoramic camera and was hooked again.

Michael is inspired by the natural environment and wild places. Unique and unusual structures and interiors are also favorite subjects. He has been a member of the Livermore Valley Camera Club (LVCC) since 2009 and has served as vice president, president and currently as secretary/treasurer.

He competes at the Masters level.

Michael regularly teaches the technical session of the LVCC's annual seven session basic photography class, held through the Livermore Area Recreation & Parks District (LARPD). He has taught classes on HDR photography and matting & framing at LARPD and Las Positas College.

About this competition:

This is a pictorial competition directed to the particular techniques and subjects that work best after the sun goes down, or just before. The elements of composition, subject interest, and the overall impact of the images apply as any non-directed pictorial competition.

March 2025: Nature (Macro)

Judged by Mark Basse

Hello, I'm Mark Basse.

We live on a ranch in Carmel Valley, California with a dozen or so horses, four rescue dogs, a few rafters of turkeys, hawks, coyotes and the occasional mountain lion. I like to say that we're not off the grid, but we can see the end of it from the front porch.

I've been creating content in higher education for 30 years with side gigs for broadcasting (HGTV, Food Network, PGA Tour, E!).

Producing, writing, shooting, editing and a myriad of other tasks that it takes to get the message to the user. I see the job as assembling a puzzle; listen to what is being said, then using a mix of the right tools (video, audio, stills, motion grfx, testimonials, story, music) at the right place, to draw the viewers in and maximize engagement. Part art, part tech.



When working on e-learning, I like to joke that my job is helping explain the unexplainable to the hopelessly misinformed. And that's the fun of it: Getting up to speed on a subject I might know very little about (biology last week, intercultural communications this week) then crafting a lesson by continuously asking ourselves if there is a better way to say this, to show this? Striking a balance between form and function, budget and time. All with a fundamental understanding that quality production value increases engagement.

I'm also never too far from a camera of one kind or another, and never too far from a trail of one kind or another as well. I also volunteer my time and experience through Patagonia's Catchafire program. I also write a blog about travels with a camera around California called Basecamp California.

About this competition:

Nature photography is the use of the photographic process to depict all branches of natural history, except anthropology and archaeology, in such a fashion that a viewer will be able to identify the subject material and recognize its honest presentation. The visual message of the photograph is considered more important than the technical considerations but high image quality is essential. This nature competition is directed to macro capture and presentation of the subject. Macro photography is extreme close-up photography of very small subjects and living organisms like insects, in which the size of the subject in the photograph is greater than life-size.


