Excellent. Not sure how much I want to nitpick. Not crazy about the color of the background but its uniform and doesn't take away from the subject. Nice movement capture at that defining moment. Technical details look excellent. \*\*\*\*



### 02 - Chalk Art.jpg

Good job of thinking about the layout of the different shapes and how they can kind of work together. The image feels a little overprocessed on the greens in particular. Possibly rather than do global saturation could just adjust 1-2 of the key colors you want to pop.



### 03 - Desert Cafe.jpg

Look at sky! No really look at that sky. So, why do we have tables and a car in this amazing scene? Your instincts were good. But how could you have gotten more of that sky and the gas pumps and CAFÉ sign? The flourscent lights are very distracting as well. Maybe in your raw you can tone them down? \*\*

Margret Cordts Feels like it is glowing! Nicely processed. No distracting background. Could add some texture through the brush to get a little bit of the ribbing in the flower petals. \*\*\*

I like the dew. But the scene is very busy. A more aperture would have helped and you can also selectively darken and blur the background.

I am not sure where to look in this image. There is different focus points on different parts of the image and my eye is not able to lock onto any particular elements and seems to get lost.



## 07 - Grand Canyon Sunrise.jpg

The eye will go to the brightest part of the image, which unfortunately is the rocks and boulders on the right. I would apply a grad filter to that to darken them and then you could do some dodging and burning down in the canyon to bring out some of the depth. We want the focus to go down into the canyon and stay down there to explore the textures.

Hmmm. The flowers certainly come at me and I see their distinct shapes but the partial blurring of the background needs to be a little more blurred and darker. It might also be worth cleaning out the cobwebs a little in photoshop.

Nice long exposure. Good colors in the sky. Could do some dodging and burning on the tufas to create some definition between them. Also would consider cropping down to a 16x9 or 1X2 as we have a lot of sky relative to the rest of the scene and the main interest in at the brighter parts closer to the horizon.

Good job centering the flower off a little and giving space but we need to get rid of the distracting lines and take some of the sharpness away from the leaves. Finding ways to bring this flower into more focus and letting the other thing fall away.

The flower is very interesting. Nice depth of field. The bee is a little almost distracting. Lazy bee. I would consider content aware filling the bottom right and cleaning up some of the pollen by the bee. \*\*\*

Play around with different compositions, light painting, orientations, to find things that engage people more. \*\*

Party! A little bit of confusion on what to focus. Also the processing is a little bright. Taking down the highlights will allow the colors to pop a little more. Would do some radials to darken into the center of the image a little more and also make the center a little brighter and sharper in focus.

The wing detail! Impressive to see this creature so close. The flower on the top left is actually a little distracting as it is in focus and so bright. Would probably reduce the sharpness on it to have it recede and keep Mr / Mrs Bee in focus. \*\*\*\*

Dennis Giuffre Glowy! Nice processing to get the rest of the image to fade and for the succulent flower to come through the way it did. This image grew on me quite a bit. \*\*\*



#### 17 - Purple Tranquility.jpg

Very nice. I got drawn in and liked the colors. The bottom right should be darkened. I would probably also darken the green leaves a little.



#### **18 - Radio City.jpg** *Jerry Heisel*

I like the concept. But this feels like a passing shot more than a planned image. The tree is blocking part of the Radio City sign. The people on the sidewalk on the left detract quite a bit. Without getting into traffic you could have moved to your right a little and shown some more of the context of the place and invited your viewer into there.

Well done. I found this image very pleasing. Could be rotated in different directions to convey and read differently. The top portion could be slightly darkened to make it more uniform. Play around a little with the highlights and shadows and you will get some color separation or less depending on what you want.

Wanted to like this one a lot more than I was able to. But not all is lost. We need some midtone contrast to get the flowers to pop and to show the definition more. Dodge / burn / tone curve would boost this up to 3 immediately \*\*

Nice colors in the sky, but we are lacking a focal point. Is it the space needle or the Columbia tower? Makes it feel unbalanced. I would play around with cropping it in and either opening up the shadows to show some of the detail in the buildings or blocking them up and only showing a silhouette. \*\*\*

*Gerald R Gifford* Color balance is off in this image. We should be seeing different color tones in a sky like this. Would also crop down the top quite a bit to draw the focus into the sunset and away from the bright parts of the sky. \*\*
